 - a. Administrator's Report Dr. Gravinese
 - The Facilities Department needs to present to and work with the Property Committee of the School Board for the **Communication Boards**. The district is covering all the costs.
 - Four Elementary schools on the playground (permanent) already started research and pricing
 - a. considering adding Skyview Dr. Gravinese will discuss with Dr. Berical
 - Skyview/Arcola maybe a mobile one Dr. Gravinese would like a visual from SEA; Jodi Kohar provided a visual
 - 2. MHS Commons /Cafeteria mobile one
 - ii. Update on Inclusive Practices model at MHS Corina Todd
 - 1. Support team organization chart attached.
 - a. All the Special Education teachers have a caseload and also teach.

- i. Caseload is typically 15-20 students per teacher (300 students total)
- ii. 5 classes + duty + prep + lunch / 6 classes + prep + lunch
- iii. Beneficial for students to see their case managers throughout the day
- iv. In the spring the case manager decides whether to keep the student on with the case manager with input from the parents, teachers and admin

b. Co-teaching

- i. The goal is for every 7 students with an IEP that needs co-taught, then 14 do not (⅓ class population requires co-taught; remainder are computer populated based on scheduling)
- ii. Supplemental "Literacy" is available for Math and English in addition to regular education classes
- iii. Direct Instruction English is a pared down gen ed class available for those with a specific disability in that area or an increased need
 - slower pace allows for time to check understanding and the ability to address specific needs of students
- iv. Adaptive English is a skill-based class driven by the student's specific needs (IEP goal based using IEP Team strategies)
 - 1. smaller class sizes
 - 2. still doing vocab and novels like academic Eng.
- v. Three-year requirement for math
 - 1. Alg $I \rightarrow Calculus B/C$
 - 2. typical path is Alg I, Alg II, Geometry
 - a. "remediation effect" from immediate movement to Alg II helps with Alg I Keystone outcomes
- vi. Same Direct Instruction class for Math as in English

- 1. Instructional Assistants will push in
- vii. Adaptive Math (similar to Adaptive English)
- viii. Science & History Three-year requirements
 - Co-taught offerings for usual 9-11 grade classes
 - No supplemental classes because there are not any specific "Science / History disabilities"
 - ix. Skills Management like a study hall where students work on executive function skills
 - x. Itinerant Support Study Hall study hall where special education teachers are present to assist students with work
- xi. Emotional Support Classroom students with Emotional Disturbance IEPs
- xii. Curriculum Support Room (CSR)– English and Math teacher there all day for support
 - 1. for any student who might need help
- xiii. Testing Center next door to the CSR quiet place for students with specific testing needs as outlined in IEPs /504s
- xiv. Two nurses
- xv. Six Guidance Counselors students remain with same counselor all four years
- xvi. Career Counselor
- xvii. Contracted Services
 - Central Behavioral Health provides
 Mental Health counselors in the building
 everyday (support students with IEP)
- xviii. REACH Program currently capped at 20 students (10/clinician)
 - any student can be recommended to program
 - Working on a solution to provide REACH to Vo-Tech students - *Mental Health is the priority
- xix. Related Services

- 1. OT, PT, Speech, Hearing and Visual
- Can get pulled out for services or they will push in with the gen ed classes (try to hit Study halls first)
- Hearing & Vision Support provided for K-12 through MCIU
- xx. Behavior Supports
 - Surpass (formerly Chancelight) and First Children Services
 - a. RBTs & BCBAs
 - b. some PCAs
 - 2. Some PCAs are MSD employees
 - a. where PCA comes from based on student's needs and behaviors and training & certifications of PCA
- xxi. Inclusion support from the MCIU Project

 Consultants support the teachers and train
 them to the students needs
- xxii. Wilson Reading intervention currently the only program the high school is offering
 - 1. placement/ screening tests
 - 2. offerings based on incoming students and the programs they've successfully used in the past
 - a. students from other districts/ schools will be assessed upon enrollment. Specific Interventions will be compared to current practices at MHS to determine any parallel offerings
 - i. students from out-of-state receive automatic re-revaluation.
- xxiii. Program Support Specialists
- xxiv. Transition Coordinator will begin to sit in IEP meetings Jr. & Sr. years to help determine best plans post high school

 can be contacted at any time before then to discuss options and plans as well

xxv. Extended School Year

- ideally NOREPS ready to go out by the end of February
- 2. MHS students at Skyview 7/8-8/1
- IEP team can agree to other programs for ESY
- Variety Club offers Summer Vocational Program at age 16
- 5. Mental Health Counselors are accessible via telehealth throughout Summer
- xxvi. English Language Development students are given access testing each January to determine continued need for programming

c. Gifted

- i. strengths-based (as opposed to needs-based)
- ii. GIEP case manager
 - parents can waive annual GIEP meetings and still maintain students' GIEP goals and access to programming
- iii. Gifted Seminar offered, though many students prefer to meet independently with case managers instead
- iv. Advanced Placement classes
- v. Independent Studies
- vi. GIEP students have access to Mental Health counselors
- d. Supervisors of Special Education in MHS and Arcola meet regularly beginning in Spring to discuss each student moving up
- 2. Pupil Services & Cirriculuum Office meet every two weeks
 - a. current discussion is about actual vs. explicit instruction
 - Principals meet with Pupil Services for monthly data meetings
- iii. Every three years a Special Education Plan needs to be updated.
